Election Analysis

I. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- a) The number of D voters will continue to trend flat while both the number of R and U voters will trend upward.
- b) Progress has been made in brining Ds out to the polls. Increased the turnout percentage by 11.6% and 6.7% over 2017 and 2021 respectively. However, the Rs still bring a slightly larger percentage of their voters out.
- c) Despite the increase in the numbers of R and R voting U voters the R's margin of victory in the First Selectman's race was reduced in 2023 over 2021, the D Candidate #2 s flipped the PZC seat from R in 2021 to D in 2023, and the D# 1 Candidate reduced the Rs margin of victory from 254 votes in 2021 to only 61 votes in 2023*

II. METHODOLOGY

The voting data from Salem Municipal Elections was evaluated for trends and insights. The data was obtained from the CT Secretary of State website as well as the Salem Registrar of Voters. The following areas were evaluated over the time-period of the last 4 municipal elections (2017 – 2023):


- a) Changes in Registered Voters. (Section III)
- b) Voter Turnout. (Section IV)
- c) Cross-Endorsed Candidates' D vs R vote results. (Section V)

Abbreviations:

- a) Democratic (D),
- b) Republican (R),
- c) Unaffiliated (U),
- d) Planning and Zoning Commission (PZC),
- e) Total Registered Voters (TRVs),
- f) Active Registered Voters (ARVs).

III. REGISTERED VOTERS

The registered voters are split into two categories, TRVs and ARVs. Chart 1 shows the change in the number of TRVs and ARVs from 2017 to 2023. In 2017 there were 930 D TRVs, 820 D ARVs, 736 R TRVs and 665 R ARVs, 1384 U TRVs and 1122 U ARVs. For this part of the evaluation, I will only look at the ARVs. The D ARVs outnumbered the R ARVs by 155, and the U ARVs outnumbered the D and R ARVs by 302 and 457 respectively. Over the course of 6 years (2017 – 2023) the number of D ARVs increased slightly to 826, where the R and the U ARVs increased to 819 and 1344 respectively in 2023. In 2023 the D ARVs outnumbered the R ARVs by only 7, a gain of 148 for the Rs since 2017. The U ARVs over the same time-period gained 216 on the Ds and 68 on the Rs respectively.



IV. VOTER TURNOUT

Generally, between 43% and 47% of Salem's registered voters turnout to vote in municipal elections. (2017 - 45.1%, 2019 - 47.2%, 2021 - 43.2%, and 2023 -44.3%) Chart 2 shows the change in voter turnout from 2017 to 2023. In 2017 we turned out 324 (39.5%) voters, vs. the Rs who turned out 320 (48.1%) voters. In the years 2017, 2019, and 2021 the we turned out more voters than the Rs however the Rs consistently turned out a higher percentage of their voters. (2017, +4, 2019, +19, 2021, +14). In the 2023 election the Rs out polled the us by 35. Additionally, we turned out fewer voters in the 2023 election (422) than we did in the 2021 election (432).


The Us generally turnout between 30% and 40% of their voters, with them turning out 35.9% of their voters in the 2023 election. Despite the lower turnout percentage, the Us out poll both us and the Rs because they outnumber the Rs and us by a third or more each.

In both 2021 and 2023 the we turned out a larger percentage of the Ds (51.1% for 2021 & 2023). That is 11.6% higher than 2017 and 6.7% higher than 2019. (See Chart 3 below)



CROSS-ENDORSED CANDIDATES V.

In this section I looked at the D vs. R vote split for candidates that were crossendorsed in every municipal election (2017 - 2023). In every case the D and R line vote totals were greater than the total number of D and R voters. This is to be expected since there are U and other party voters voting. However, in every case the R line vote total was greater than the D line vote total which indicates the Us generally voted the R line.

The U voters voting R vs. D delta is the

difference between the # of U votes on the D line and R line. In all cases more U voters voted on the R line with a low of 72 and a high of 213 depending on the election. See the D/R Split Chart above.

VI. CONCLUSION

Registered Voter Outlook

Despite the number of D and R voters being roughly the same the U voters outnumber each by approximately a third, and consistently the majority appear to vote R. If there are no major changes in Salem's population total, the trend over the span of the last 4 municipal elections (6 years) is likely to continue unchanged, i.e.,

- The number of registered Democratic voters is likely to remain flat at best,
- The number of registered Republican voting Unaffiliated voters are likely to increase, and b)
- Most of the U voters turning out will likely continue to vote R.

Comparison of the First Selectman and PZC Member 2021 & 2023 Race Results 1st Selectman Race

The total number of votes cast in the 2021 and 2023 First Selectman race were similar, 1396 votes in 2021 and 1358 in 2023 (38 fewer then in 2021).

• Election Analysis (continued)

Despite the Ds turning out 19 fewer Democratic voters in 2023 vs. 2021:

- a) The Democratic candidate received virtually the same number of Democratic line votes in 2021 and 2023 (2 fewer in 2023).
- b) The Republican line margin of victory in 2023 was reduced by 34 votes vs. 2021. The Republican line margin of victory was 124 votes in 2023.

Despite the Rs turning out 39 more voters in 2023 than in 2021 the Republican candidate received 36 fewer Republican line votes in 2023 vs. 2021. (see charts below)

PZC Race - Candidate #1

The total number of votes cast in the 2021 and 2023 PZC Member race for D candidate #1 was similar; 1362 in 2021 and 1395 in 2023.

Despite the Ds turning out 19 fewer Democratic voters in 2023 vs. 2021:

- a) The Democratic candidate received 143 more Democratic line votes in 2023 vs. 2021.
- b) The Republican line margin of victory in 2023 was reduced by 253 votes vs. 2021. The Republican line margin of victory was only 61 votes in 2023.

Despite the Rs turning out 39 more voters in 2023 vs. 2021, the Republican candidate received 135 fewer Republican line votes in 2023 vs. 2021. (see charts below)


PZC Race - Candidate #2

The total number of votes cast in the 2023 PZC Member race for D candidate #2 increased by 173 votes vs. 2021. Despite the Ds turning out 19 fewer Democratic voters in 2023 vs. 2021:


- a) The Democratic candidate received 185 more Democratic line votes in 2023 vs. 2021.
- b) D Candidate #2 flipped the seat from R to D with the margin of victory of 43 votes vs. the R margin of victory of 154 votes in 2021.

Despite the Rs turning out 39 more voters in 2023 vs. 2021, the Republican candidate received 12 fewer Republican line votes in 2023 vs. 2021. (see charts below)

* **NOTE:** The reason the 2021 and 2023 First Selectman's and the Planning and Zoning Commissioner races were used to compare the margins of victory is because in 1st Selectman race the R candidate and in the PZC race the Democratic candidate were the same persons. In looking at the margin of victory in down-ticket races there was no way to quantify the effect an individual candidate had on the votes since both candidates the pairings were all different.

OPION

We Made Gains In The Election, By: Gary Closius 12/08/2023

Just a few thoughts on the results of the 2023 municipal elections. Despite not having more Democratic candidates elected, there are some positives we can take:

- 1. In the last two municipal elections (2021 & 2023) we brought a significantly larger percentage of the Ds to the polls than the previous two municipal elections.
- 2. We decreased the Republican margin of victory in the 1st Selectman's race by approximately 22% over the previous election despite bringing fewer Ds to the polls and being out polled by the Republicans.
- 3. We flipped one seat on the PZC from R to D and significantly reduced the Republican margin of victory of the other seat by approximately 81% despite bringing fewer Ds to the polls and being out polled by the Republicans.

A bill discount will be available for residential electric customers starting in December 2023.

You must have financial hardship status on your electric account. If you do, there are two tiers of discount depending on your annual household income or receipt of a public assistance benefit.

Eligible income for 10% Discount Rate

To qualify, your household annual income for all adults over 18 must be at or below 60% of the state median income, or you can show receipt of a public assistance benefit for at least one household member.


