Concerns Over SNAP Cuts


Nearly two dozen Democratic governors are calling on federal leaders to reverse or avoid potential severe cuts to Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits proposed in the current draft of the national budget, saying the cuts would make people suffer and cause pain across the country. In a letter to Congress, the governors said SNAP cuts would impact the food and nutritional access for thousands of Connecticut adults and children and millions nationwide. The most recent budget proposal passed by the House



would cut \$300 million from SNAP, reducing federal support to states and making it harder for residents to qualify. *Read more from CT Insider here*.

Operation Fuel Expands Its Scope

Operation Fuel, which has been operating for decades to help Connecticut residents with utility costs, *rebranded to GenerationPower CT* to better support its expanded scope, Fox 61 reported. Generation Power CT offers aid for electricity, water and other utilities, also aiding with remediation and weatherization of properties, and its new title represents those additional services. In 2024, Generation Power CT gave millions of dollars in aid to thousands of families across the state.



Paid Family Medical Leave Updates, Webinars

Starting on October 1 of this year, noncertified public and nonpublic school employees – meaning school employees whose positions do not require certifications – will become eligible for the CT Paid Leave program. CT Paid Leave will host a series of webinars for workers at public and nonpublic schools in July, August and September, explaining the significance of these changes and how workers can get involved. Governor Vetoes Housing, Striking Workers' Benefits Bills

I was extremely disappointed that HB 5002 (housing) and SB 4 (striking workers receiving unemployment benefits under limited conditions) were vetoed recently by the governor.

No legislation is perfect, and there certainly were things that I wish had been different in the housing bill, but this proposed law that would have provided needed (and asked for) technical and planning supports for municipalities and was a step in the right direction overall.

There was a lot of misinformation disseminated about the housing bill, so I understand if there was confusion and am happy to try and clear up any questions.

To start: this did not take away local control, it did not penalize anyone, and simply asked municipalities to make their own plan and 'try' to make progress with housing in their communities.

If there were any teeth at all in this bill, they weren't very sharp.

If we want to grow our economy, reduce homelessness, and give our own kids the chance to come back and live in their hometowns, we need to address the very serious housing concerns across the state.

While not at the same scale, I was also disappointed, though not surprised, about SB4 being vetoed. I will simply say I will continue to work tirelessly to represent the working people of our district and the state, to level the playing

field between labor and management. Right now, the thumb is clearly pressed down on the scale in favor of large corporations. This has to change for residents to not only get by, but to thrive.

New Laws that Took Effect July 1

Several new laws that were passed during the 2025 legislative session took effect on Tuesday. Please see below to read about some of them.

- Our two-year, \$55.8 billion budget took effect July 1. This bill reflects our shared values, marked by historic investments in children through expanded funding for special education and childcare.
 - Our budget strengthens support for working families and ensures that the essential work of nonprofits is both valued and financially supported.
- Another bill that went into effect is our bond package, which provides nearly \$10 billion for Connecticut municipalities to fund projects in school construction, transportation infrastructure, housing assistance, and many more local initiatives.

New Laws that Took Effect July 1 (continued)

- Our students will learn about three essential topics in the classroom: civics, media literacy, and Asian American
 and Pacific Islander history. Under two bills passed in 2022 and 2023, students will gain an understanding of
 what it means to be an active and engaged citizen, how to analyze the modern media landscape, and the rich
 history of the AAPI community in our state and the entire country.
- Our elections will be more secure and transparent as video recording technology will be added to every
 absentee ballot drop box in our state. This new law will record the drop boxes from the first day that ballots are
 issued up through when the clerk retrieves the final ballots, and all of these recordings will be made available
 to the public.
- A novel, landmark bill supporting public libraries struggling to afford the skyrocketing costs of e-books and digital audiobooks will go into effect July 1. The bill bars libraries from entering into or renewing expensive contracts and licensing agreements with publishers. The measure positions Connecticut as a national leader in this arena and marks a significant step toward transparency, equity, and sustainability in how libraries acquire and provide digital resources to the public.
- Many more bills are going into effect July 1, including one that reforms Connecticut's towing system, one that
 requires financial literacy instruction in school, and more.

Reproductive Rights Under Siege

REPRODUCTIVE RIGHTS CAUCUS STATEMENT ON THE U.S. SUPREME COURT'S DECISION UPHOLDING BAN ON MEDICAID PATIENT ACCESS TO PLANNED PARENTHOOD

Today's ruling by the U.S. Supreme Court is a dangerous setback for reproductive freedom and patient rights in this country. By upholding South Carolina's ban on state Medicaid funding for Planned Parenthood, the Court has allowed an illegal policy to stand—not by affirming its legality, but by ruling that patients and providers cannot go to court to challenge it. This ruling paves the way for states to discriminate against organizations that provide comprehensive reproductive care, privileging ideology and depriving patients of the care they need and deserve.

In stark contrast, Connecticut has taken bold and proactive steps to protect and expand access to reproductive health care. This year, the Connecticut General Assembly increased Medicaid funding for Planned Parenthood to ensure continued access to critical services for our most vulnerable residents and strengthen our reproductive healthcare infrastructure.

Connecticut's Reproductive Freedom Defense Act further ensures that providers, patients, and those who help them are protected from hostile out-of-state laws and legal threats. We will not let extremist policies elsewhere erode our values or rights here in Connecticut.

The BOS Should Approve the CRC Proposed Charter Revision

Background

The First Selectman commissioned a Charter Revision Commission (CRC) comprised of very qualified people. The Commission included Republicans, Democrats and unaffiliated voters. The CRC members include a former Salem First Selectman, a former Town Administrator, a retired superior court judge, a prominent Salem business man, the president of a local nonprofit organization, and long-time respected members of Salem's community.

Over these months CRC generally held two meetings per month all open for the public to attend. Each meeting had a public comment section on the agenda where the public is free and encouraged to, make their opinions, thoughts and input known. The CRC actively solicited input from the public, all the boards and commissions, and elected officials. In late December early January, the CRC mailed a survey to all households in Salem soliciting input from the community.

After these many months of work the bipartisan CRC submitted a Draft Revision to Salem's Charter to the BOS for their review and approval. In a letter to the First Selectman and the BOS the CRC summarized the changes to the Town's administrative structure and processes proposed in the Revised Charter. Some key items to note; the basic form of the Town of Salem's government has **NOT BEEN CHANGED**. Salem will still have an elected Chief Executive (First Selectman) and an elected BOS as well as other elected and appointed boards and commissions. The Town Meeting will remain the legislative body of the town. The Board of Finance remains in the review cycle for the Town Budget and will continue the set the mill rate for the town.

Some key proposed changes in the Revised Charter from the current Charter:

- 1. The Town will hire a professional Town Administrator reporting to the BOS to assist in the management/supervision of the day-to-day operation of the town and town employees, as well as research duties.
- 2. The positions of Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, and Tax Collector would become hired positions.
- 3. When vacancies on elected board or commissions occur the Chairperson of the board or commission has 60 days (30 days under the current Charter) to call a meeting of said board or commission to fill the vacancy.

4. There are many other changes ranging from administrative (typos etc.) to adding more defined terms, to a new section proposing new rules of order and civility, to streamlining the budget development process.

Opinion

The BOS completed their review and is proposing many changes to the CRC Draft Charter Revision that effectively guts it. To say I was disappointed in the BOS's proposed changes would be an understatement. Some of the major changes contained in the BOS proposed change to the CRC Draft Charter Revision are:

- 1. The CRC recommended Salem hire a professional Town Administrator reporting to the First Selectman and the BOS to manage the day-to-day administrative business of the Town. The Draft Charter Revision provided the framework and details of the duties and responsibilities of the Town Administrator.
 In their proposed Revision the BOS severely water-down the roles and responsibilities of the Town Administrator. The BOS proposed change specifies that the First Selectman in addition to supervising the administration of the affairs of the Town, also trains and supervises the work of the Town Administrator. (see pages 26 and 27, sections 5.2 A. and 5.2 B.)
- 2. The CRC recommended the Town Clerk, Tax Collector and Treasurer be hired verses elected officials. These are non-policy making positions and require the individuals to be certified.
 - In their proposed Revision the BOS propose to have the Town Clerk, Tax Collector remain elected officials. This limits the pool of perspective candidates to Salem residents only and may restrict the Town from filling the position with the most qualified person. Further should there be job performance issues it is difficult and expensive to remove an elected official.
- 3. In their proposed Revision the BOS added a requirement for filling vacancies on Boards and Commissions that the replacement be filled by a person of the same political party or affiliation as that of the person who just vacated the office; or, in the alternative an unaffiliated elector. (page 15, section 2.6 D)

This requirement politicizes filling vacancies by placing party affiliation ahead of candidate qualifications. This could result in not filling the vacancy with the most qualified replacement which is not in the best interest of the Town.

The BOS proposed changes to the CRC Revised Charter was presented to Salem residents in a public hearing attended by my estimation by at least 50 residents. On the order of twenty residents commented on the BOS changes to the proposed CRC Revised Charter. By my unscientific and unofficial count, the public spoke in favor by a 3 to 1 margin of the BOS leaving the CRC Revised Charter intact and letting the voters decide in November. I agree with the majority of the residents who commented in favor of the CRC Revised Charter at the public hearing. I suggest in the strongest terms possible that the BOS approve CRC Revised Charter as submitted and let the voters decide in November.

5 Myths About Undocumented Immigrants¹

MYTH #1: Anyone who enters the country illegally is a criminal.

Facts:

Being an undocumented (or "illegal") immigrant has been, until now, only a civil, not a criminal violation. Under federal immigration law, unlawful presence in this country is a civil offense. The civil penalty for being in this country unlawfully is deportation, or removal, which the U.S. Supreme Court has held is not "criminal punishment." However, some states—like Arizona—are trying to criminalize an undocumented immigrant's mere presence.

5 Myths About Undocumented Immigrants (continued from p 8)

MYTH #2: Undocumented immigrants do not have any rights in the U.S.

Facts:

Undocumented immigrants have the right to access the courts. They have rights in their homes, and those who have been arrested or who are in custody have certain constitutional rights under the Fourth, Fifth, and Sixth Amendments. Undocumented immigrants have rights in the workplace, including the right to minimum wage and overtime pay. Undocumented immigrant children have the right to a public-school education. Undocumented immigrant children may now qualify for in-state tuition to attend college in Connecticut and a few other states. Undocumented immigrants can own property and get mortgages. Undocumented immigrants can be child support obligors or obligees and can get court orders giving them custody of their children. (Connecticut courts have not ruled on what role, if any, a parent's immigration status should play in making custody determinations.)

MYTH #3: Immigrants don't want to become citizens.

Facts:

Immigrants come to the U.S. for a variety of reasons — to reunite with family or to find better employment opportunities — and would prefer to do so through legal channels. However, avenues to legalize under the U.S. immigration system are extremely limited, and most undocumented immigrants in the U.S. cannot simply apply for a visa and obtain legal status. (It is untrue that most undocumented immigrants can simply fall in love and get married to a U.S. citizen in order to legalize. In most cases, even those who are married to U.S. citizens and who have U.S. citizen children are not eligible to legalize under current immigration laws.) Those immigrants who are eligible and seek citizenship do so despite difficult requirements and huge backlogs that can delay the process for years.

MYTH #4: Undocumented and documented immigrants represent distinct populations.

Facts:

Most immigrant families are of "mixed" immigration status. Two-thirds of all children with undocumented parents (about 3 million) are U.S.-born citizens and thus live in mixed-status families. Of the nearly 12 million undocumented aliens estimated to be living in the U.S., about two million are children who entered the country at a young age with their parents and who did not independently decide to break U.S. immigration laws: they speak English and have grown up in this country and yet they face limited educational and employment opportunities given their immigrant status.

MYTH #5: Undocumented immigrants don't pay taxes but still get benefits.

Facts:

All immigrants (legal and undocumented) pay sales, property, and consumption taxes; many undocumented immigrants also pay income taxes, even though they can't benefit from most federal and state local assistance programs. Contrary to popular belief, undocumented workers are not (and have never been) eligible to claim social security benefits. In fact, most undocumented workers will use a false social security number to prove work authorization, therefore paying money into a benefit system that they may never be eligible to use. According to the Social Security Administration, undocumented immigrants account for a "major portion" of the billions of dollars paid into the Social Security system—an estimated \$520 billion as of October 2005. Immigrants' tax payments support both local and state services in addition to the federal government. One study shows that immigrants, regardless of status, will pay on average \$80,000 per capita more in taxes than they use in government services over their lifetime. Undocumented immigrants can receive schooling and emergency medical care, but not welfare, food stamps, Medicaid, and most other public benefits. 



A prescription drug discount card program was launched in Connecticut on October 2, 2023, enabling all residents of the state to receive savings on certain prescription drugs. The program was established by a provision of Governor Lamont's health care affordability bill (Public Act 23-171), which was approved by the General Assembly and signed into law in June. It is administered by the Office of the State Comptroller.




