A CALL TO ACTION

Leslie Hotary (Secretary for the SDTC) reached out to Jonathan Perloe – Director of Communications, CT Against Gun Violence (CAGV) in an effort to get information on House Bill 6667, AN ACT ADDRESSING GUN VIOLENCE. Mr. Perloe provided the following:

"With the news of the Nashville school shooting (the 130th mass shooting* this year) fresh on our minds, it's good to know that Gov. Lamont and our state legislators continue to aggressively pursue measures to reduce gun violence in Connecticut. Although the state remains one of the safest from gun violence, it's still a public health crisis: gun homicides last year were the highest in 25 years.

The Governor's Act Addressing Gun Violence, HB-6667 (use the following link to view the legislative fact sheet: <a href="https://portal.ct.gov/-/media/Office-of-the-Governor/2023-Legislative-Proposals/AA-Addressing-Gun-the-Governor/2023-Legislative

<u>Violence.pdf</u>), was just voted out of the Judiciary Committee. It's the most expansive bill considered since the Sandy Hook bill passed in 2013.

According to CT Against Gun Violence, the provisions that will have the greatest impact on saving lives are continued funding of community violence intervention programs, implementing a "no exceptions" safe storage law and making the state's ban on ghost guns more enforceable. Other measures include closing loopholes in the state's assault weapons ban, strengthening penalties related to the ban on large-capacity magazines and increasing the age to purchase any firearm to 21. IT IS TIME TO TAKE ACTION AGAINST GUN VIOLENCE

On Monday March 27th a gunman took the lives of three 9-year-old children and three



adults in a mass school shooting at the Covenant School in Nashville Tennessee. Another school shooting yet again. Mass shooters have killed hundreds of people throughout U.S. history in realms like stores, theaters, night clubs, and workplaces, but it is in schools and colleges where the carnage reverberates perhaps most keenly — places filled with children of tender ages, older students aspiring to new heights and the teachers planting the seeds of knowledge, their journeys all cut short.

If a mass shooting is defined as a shooting resulting in the death of four or more people, not including the perpetrator, 175 people have died in 15 such events connected to U.S. schools and colleges in the last 24 years — from 1999's Columbine High School massacre to last Monday's shooting at the Covenant School in Nashville, Tennessee according to a database compiled by The Associated Press, USA Today and Northeastern University, in addition to other AP reporting. Here is a list of the school mass shootings over the last 24 years:

- 1. *The Covenant School*, March 2023, 6 dead (3 children and 3 staff members)
- 2. *Robb Elementary School*, May 2022, 21 dead (19 children and 3 staff members)
- 3. Oxford High School, November 2021, 4 dead (4 children)
- 4. Santa Fe High School, May 2018, 10 dead (8 children, 3 staff members)
- 5. *Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School*, February 2018, 17 dead (14 children and 3 staff members)
- 6. *Umpqua Community College*, October 2015, 9 dead (8 students, 1 staff member)
- 7. *Marysville-Pilchuck High School*, October 2014, 4 dead (4 children)
- 8. *University Of California, Santa Barbara*, May 2014, 6 dead (6 students)
- 9. **Sandy Hook Elementary School**, December 2012, 27 dead (20 children and 6 staff members)
- 10. *Oikos University*, April 2012, 7 dead (6 students, 1 staff member)
- 11. **Northern Illinois University**, February 2008, 5 dead (5 students)
- 12. *Virginia Tech*, April 2007, 32 dead (27 students and 5 staff members)
- 13. West Nickel Mines Amish School, October 2006, 5 dead (5 children)
- 14. *Red Lake High School*, March 2005, 9 dead (5 children, 2 staff members)
- 15. *Columbine High School*, April 1999, 13 dead (12 children, 1 staff member)



As reported by ABC News, so far in 2023, 9,870 people have died from gun violence in the U.S, as of March 27th, according to the Gun Violence Archive* (GVA). Here are the grim statistics:

- There's been an average of about 115 deaths per day in 2023
- Deaths by suicide made up the vast majority of gun violence deaths this year - 57.9%
- There's been an average of about 67 deaths by suicide per day in 2023
- Of those who died from gun violence this year, 338 were teens (12 17 years of age) and 60 were children (0 11 years of age) for a total of 398
- The U.S. has surpassed 39,000 deaths from gun violence per year since 2014, according to data from GVA. Still, gun deaths have been down from 2016, 2017 and 2018, when the total number of deaths each year surpassed 50,000. There were 44,310 such deaths in 2022. The table below details the gun violence statistics for the past 9 years.
- In just the last 72 hours (March 27th 30th) 87 people died and 215 were injured as the result of gun violence in the U.S.

Gun violence is the leading cause of death for US children and teens, since surpassing car accidents in 2020. Firearms accounted for nearly 19% of childhood deaths (ages 1-18) in 2021, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Wonder database. Nearly 3,600 children died in gun-related incidents that year. That's about five children lost for every 100,000 children in the United States. *Children are more likely to be killed by a gun than in a car accident.*



How many more parents have to send their children to school only to never see them again? How many more people must be injured or die from gun violence before enough is enough and action is taken on the federal level? I am glad to see Gov. Lamont proposed House Bill 6667, AN ACT ADDRESSING GUN VIOLENCE. It's the most expansive bill considered since the Sandy Hook bill passed a decade ago. I strongly urge you to contact Senator Chris Murphy, Senator Richard Blumenthal, and Representative Joe Courtney to initiate, or support commonsense gun violence prevention federal legislation. I also strongly urge you to ask Salem's state legislators (State Senator Martha Marx, and State Representatives Irene Haines (34th district) and Holly Cheeseman (37th district)) to support House Bill 6667.

• SUMMARY OF PROPOSED SALEM BUDGET CHANGES 2023/2024

The Board of Finance (BOF) has approved a budget for presentation at the Public Hearing on April 12th at 7:00 PM in the Salem School Multi-purpose room. This year's proposed budget is an increase over the current approved budget (fiscal year 2022-2023). (see table below)

Some of these increases are the same things that are driving our family budgets up.

- Fuel for our vehicles is **UP \$2,313** over last year.
- Electricity is **UP \$7,191** for General Government and **\$7,479** for the school over last year.
- ➤ Heat is UP \$1,663 for General Government and \$56,226 for the school over last year.

♦ HIGHLIGHTS IN THE BUDGET COMPONENTS

- ➤ **Board of Education** there is a net decrease with spending increases per school strategic plan. (The BOF cut \$88,000 from the original budget the BOE approved).
- ➤ The BOE committed to cutting the money but wants to work with staff to decide what cuts will be least detrimental. This will take some time to sort out what items will be cut to limit the impact on the strategic plan and programs.
 - **Health Insurance** The rate increase is approximately 7.2%.
 - Reconciliation goes in our favor for next year (After the high school budget is audited, East Lyme and Salem make adjustments to what Salem paid. Next year we will get a credit for a year that was less expensive than expected.) The number of high school seniors graduating exceeds the number of 8th graders entering high school, so we will be paying East Lyme for fewer students next year.
 - **Teacher's salaries** Five (5) top step teachers have notified the school that they will be retiring at the end of this school year. It is anticipated that new hires will be at a much lower salary. This savings will be ongoing for future years.
 - **BOE strategic plan** The BOE has developed a strategic plan to solve problems and improve education in the school. This involves some new hires and some stipends for to compensate staff who take on additional responsibilities.

Capital Budget – large items

- School Building Improvements Replacement of school roof (\$451,875) and air conditioning units (\$114,400), multi-year payment plan
- Road improvements \$442,243 part of the regular road maintenance schedule
- SVFCO Engine Tanker payment -\$120,000 (multi-year payment plan)
- Over The Rail Mower \$60,000, (multi-year payment plan)
- Front End Loader \$70,000, multi-year payment plan)

General Government

- **Total Salary Increases \$195,125.00,** restructure of public works, addition of Fire Marshals, restructure Finance/HR Department as well as bringing some other staff position pay rates up to regional standards.
- **Town Counsel Increase \$44,000,** this incudes contract negotiation, labor and other legal expenses.
- Employee Benefits Increase \$29,543, health insurance increase.
- **Emergency Services increase \$15,000,** 911 contract increase, radio upgrades, and records management increase.
- **Civil Preparedness increase \$12,600,** emergency equipment.
- Transfer Station increase \$14,943, increases in the hauling and tipping fees.

> WHAT ISN'T INCLUDED IN THE BUDGET

In 2023 the Town commissioned Municipal Resources, Inc. (MRI) to review and evaluate Emergency Services (fire-fighting EMT/Ambulance services, etc.) in the Town and provide a report of their findings. The report was expected early in 2023 in order to support the 2023/2024 budget development process. The final MRI report is now not expected until the end of April or beginning of May. It is the BOF's position that the Board needs to know what the recommendations are detailed in the MRI Report so that the Town has a chance to understand the requirements and priorities before committing to spending money on them. This is unfortunate, as the information will not be available in time to support the Town Meeting and Referendum process. Therefore, any changes/increases to the 2023/2024 budget as a result of the MRI Report recommendations will need to be addressed through a special Town Meeting and most probably a Referendum should additional funding beyond the approved 2023/2024 budget, be necessary. It is the BOF's plan to handle the changes/increases without a mid-year tax increase.


