TRUMP ISN'T BLUFFING1

We've become inured to his rhetoric, but his message has grown darker.

Editor's Note: This article is part of "If Trump Wins", by David A. Grahm a project considering what Donald Trump might do if reelected in 2024.

"We pledge to you that we will root out the Communists, Marxists, fascists, and the radical-left thugs that live like vermin within the confines of our country, that lie and steal and cheat on elections," Donald Trump said this past November, in a campaign speech that was ostensibly honoring Veterans Day. "The real threat is not from the radical right; the real threat is from the radical left ... The threat from outside forces is far less sinister, dangerous, and grave than the threat from within. Our threat is from within."

What immediately leaps out here is the word *vermin*, with its echoes of Hitler and Mussolini. But Trump's inflammatory language can overshadow and distract from the substance of what he's saying—in this case, appearing to promise a purge or repression of those who disagree with him politically.

This sort of language isn't entirely new. Trump spoke in Manichaean terms throughout his first campaign and term, encouraging chants to lock up Hillary Clinton in 2016, and in 2018 referring to undocumented immigrants as "animals" who would "infest our country." Over time, the shock of Trump's rhetoric has worn off, making it easy to miss the fact that his message has grown even darker.

Trump himself has changed, too—the old Trump seemed to be running for office partly for fun and partly in service of his signature views, such as opposition to immigration and support for protectionism. Today's Trump is different. His fury over his 2020 election defeat, the legal cases against him, and a desire for revenge against political opponents have come to eclipse everything else.

In the past few months, the former president has described himself as a "very proud election denier." He has repeatedly threatened and intimidated judges, witnesses, prosecutors, and even the family of prosecutors involved in the cases against him, going so far as to say that his legal opponents will be consigned to mental asylums if he's reelected. He has suggested that the man he picked for chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff deserves to be executed on grounds of treason. He's called for investigating NBC and possibly yanking the network off the air, also on grounds of treason—one of his most direct attacks on the First Amendment. And he's vowed to arrest and indict President Joe Biden and other political opponents for no apparent reason other than that they oppose him.

The fact that Trump's ideas have become more authoritarian is not yet fully appreciated. One reason is people have heard Trump say outlandish things for so long that they can't identify what's new, or they've become numb. Another is venue: Once Trump left the White House and stopped tweeting, his vitriol became less noticeable to anyone who didn't attend his rallies, seek out videos of them, or join Trump's own Truth Social network.

Even when a comment is so extreme that it does break into the mainstream, what happens next is predictable. The first time Trump says something, people react with shock and compare him to Hitler. The second time, people say Trump is at it again. By the third time, it becomes background noise—an appalling but familiar part of the Trump shtick.

This is just the sort of "normalization" that Trump's critics warned against from the start, but it's also a natural human response to repeated exposure. The result is that Trump has been able to acclimate the nation to authoritarianism by introducing it early and often. When a second-term President Trump directs the Justice Department to lock up Democratic politicians or generals or reporters or activists on flimsy or no grounds at all, people will wring their hands, but they'll also shrug and wonder why he didn't do it sooner. After all, he's been promising to do it forever, right?

Do we, as Americans want to have a president who:

- Mr. Trump denigrated his domestic opponents and critics during a Veterans Day speech, calling those on the other side of the aisle "vermin".
- Mr. Trump said undocumented immigrants were "poisoning the blood of our country." Reminiscent of Hitler's manifesto.
- Mr. Trump pledged "to root out the communists, Marxists, fascists and the radical left thugs that live like vermin within the confines of our country that lie and steal and cheat on elections."
- Mr. Trump said at the beginning his 2024 presidential campaign, the "termination" of the Constitution would have been justified to overturn the 2020 election.
- Mr. Trump said he would use the Justice Department to have his adversaries investigated and charged with crimes, including saying in June that he would appoint "a real special prosecutor to go after" President Biden and his family.
- Mr. Trump charged in December 2022, that the fraud he insists took place in the 2020 election "allows for the termination of all rules, regulations and articles, even those found in the constitution."
- Mr. Trump told supporters: "I am your retribution." Mr. Trump suggested he would use FBI to go after political rivals if elected in 2024.
- Mr. Trump promised to pardon January 6 insurrectionists.
- Mr. Trump responded "Only on day one." When asked by Sean Hannity in December 2023, if he intended to act like a dictator.
- Mr. Trump said in a campaign speech on February 10, 2024, he would "encourage" Russia to attack any of the US's NATO allies whom he considers to have not met their financial obligations.

We must not let ourselves become desensitized, deaf to, or ignore the outrageous, anti-democratic, and dangerous things Mr. Trump is saying in his campaign speeches. We cannot just chalk up what he says as "that's just Trump being Trump" or that it is just bluster. If it walks like a duck, and talks like a duck, it's a duck.


RECENT HEATING BOILER & FIRE ALARM SYSTEM ISSUE AT THE SALEM SCHOOL

The following is the description of the Salem Middle School boiler event that occurred on Sunday January 21, 2024. The text and diagram are directly from a letter *To: Brian Hendrickson, Superintendent, from: Chris Lund, Director of Facilities, dated February 2, 2024.*

Review of Boiler Incident

As everyone knows, on Sunday 1/21, local responders, school administrative and facilities staff, and repair contractors responded to the school in response to a neighbor calling EMS after seeing black smoke billowing from the chimney. The overarching cause of the black smoke was a malfunction of the old boiler burner unit. As a reminder, this boiler was installed when the MS [Middle School] wing was built and is past due for replacement based on industry accepted standards.

Please click here [see diagram to the right] for a cut away diagram that shows the interior of the burner and its operation. In simplest terms, the boiler creates heat by burning oil. The oil is pumped through a nozzle assembly under pressure which turns it into a fine spray. The fuel spray is ignited as it exits the nozzle by two electrodes that create an electrical arc. This is similar to how a spark plug works in a car engine. The spray burns in the combustion chamber where its energy is captured and used to create hot water which is pumped through the building to provide heat. The exhaust exits through the chimney assembly and to the outside. When operating properly and at peak efficiency, the exhaust is nearly invisible. On the day of interest upon arrival, the repair technician removed the nozzle assembly, and found that one of the two electrodes was not in the correct position to provide its arc to ignite the fuel. As a result, a portion of the fuel, possibly



as high as 50%, was not burning efficiently. This ultimately led to the creation of the black smoke reported as well as a large amount of soot on the interior. It is unknown why the electrode was displaced. It is an old unit, and wear and tear of parts may have resulted in the electrode slipping out of tolerance. Regardless, the technician repaired the assembly, drilled and installed new fasteners to ensure all components are as tight and properly spaced as when originally installed, and returned the unit to operation. It has been operating correctly since it was repaired.

It should be noted that the typical service life of a boiler in this application is approximately 20 years. The Middle School boilers went into service in 1994 so, they have been in service approximately 29 years.

The funding to replace the boilers (\$75K) was first included in the fiscal year (F/Y) 2014/2015 10-year capital plan. They were scheduled to be replaced in F/Y 2016/2017. In the F/Y 2017/2018 10-year capital plan, funding to replace the boilers was moved to F/Y 2019/2020. In the F/Y 2019/2020 10-year capital plan the funding to replace boilers (\$114.4) was moved to F/Y 2023/2024. They were approved this year for replacement in F/Y 2023/2024. However, it is a prevailing wage project, so there are not enough funds to do the project. The Salem School Facility Director requested an additional \$50,000 for the F/Y 2024/2025 budget for the project. If approved, the boilers can be replaced this summer. The first year the funds to upgraded alarm system was requested was F/Y 2020/2021. It was not approved for the 10-year capital plan that F/Y. The funding was requested again for the F/Y 2021/2022 budget year and it was included in year F/Y 2022/2023 of the capital plan. In the F/Y 2022/2023 capital plan, the funding to upgraded alarm system was moved to F/Y 2024/2025. It remains on the schedule for replacement in F/Y 2024/2025 per the 10-year capital plan approved for F/Y 2023/2024.

Why Was The Capital Funding For The Salem Middle School Boiler Replacement Project Postponed Several Times? By G. Closius, February 9, 2023

The Salem Middle School Boilers were installed when the newest school addition was completed in 1994. The boilers are almost 30 years old. According to NTT Training (a division of ECPI University) and several equipment suppliers and maintenance companies including MDM Mechanical, most industrial boilers tend to last between 15 to 25 years, on average, with 25 years being on the high end if they are well maintained and serviced regularly. If the boilers had been replaced in F/Y 2017/2018 for \$75K as originally planned the boilers would have been in service for 23 years near the upper limit of its expected lifespan. The funds for replacement of the boilers were deferred 3 times with the funds (\$114.4K) currently in F/Y 2023/2024. The boilers still haven't been replaced and now there are issues. Should the boilers fail and need replacement during the winter when there is a need for heat and school is in session, as a minimum additional funds would be needed to cover leasing an alternate location to conduct classes as well as transportation to and from that location.

In the run-up to the last two Salem municipal elections the current administration has made it a point to note that they have managed the Town's budget and expenditures so as to keep "taxes flat." So now the question is, did the quest to keep taxes "flat" go too far and cost the Town more to replace the boiler and potently more if the replacement needs to be done while school is in session?

The next question is, are there other examples of deferring project funds potentially costing the Town more? Could the deferring the funding the replacement project for replacing 1994 Roof Top A/C Units (\$175K) in F/Y 2017/2018 to F/Y 2018/2019, and then to F/Ys 2022/2023 through 2026/2027 (\$100K each year) be another example?
