## Message From State Senator Martha Marx (D 20th District)

Dear Neighbor,

I'm grateful to Governor Lamont and the State Bond Commission for their recognition of our communities. In Old Lyme, these investments will greatly improve local nautical resources, providing more access for traveling boaters and allowing emergency boats to respond to duress calls in much quicker fashion. Supporting first responders is also a priority in New London, reimbursing the town's police for acquiring dash and body cameras to increase transparency and facilitate better trust between the town and its officers.

Among the items approved in the Bond Commission agenda were:

- \$228,500 to support the expansion of Old Lyme's Town Dock, adding the ability to support transient small boats and dockage for town emergency services vessels,
- \$33,000 for permitting in Old Lyme to start the process of maintenance dredging the Four Mile River.
- \$109,673 to reimburse purchases of body cameras, dash cameras and video storage devices for the New London Police Department.

#### Trump Tariffs Officially Announced

Tariffs long-threatened by the Trump administration were officially put in place this week, with economists and business professionals nearly universally reporting the plan will have a heavy toll on consumer prices, inflation and the stock market. The tariffs, which are effectively import taxes as they require an importer to pay a surcharge on the cost of goods to the federal government, range from 10% to 49% for different countries trading with the United States, as some countries face flat tariffs and others have custom focuses. At large, this effectively means \$4 trillion in import goods will face a minimum of a 10% tax.



One of the biggest factors of the tariffs was an immediate 25% tariff on all foreign-made automobiles, expected to increase the cost of many vehicle models by thousands of dollars. Countries with major imports to America, including Vietnam, Cambodia, China and Taiwan, are subject to new tariffs over 30%, meaning electronics and clothing will also be among the products with price hikes in the near future – though almost all imported goods will be covered. Some heavily imported goods will include shoes and produce; several food items covered under the tariffs cannot be grown in the United States.

The global tariffs come in addition to previously announced 25% tariffs on Canada and Mexico and previously announced tariffs on China. The stock market saw sharp drops immediately after the tariffs' announcement and that decline continued into future market days. A number of economists raised alarms predicting the impacts of the tariffs could send the national economy into a recession. With an expected cost of up to \$6 trillion for American consumers, and economists expecting the tariffs to cost the average American household up to \$4,200 annually, this is expected to be the largest tax increase in American history.

#### CT Home Funds Invests In Homeownership

Connecticut launched CT Home Funds this week, a \$30 million investment in three housing programs preserving, incentivizing and increasing homeownership opportunities across the state. These programs include the Connecticut Home Improvement Program, which will receive \$8.5 million to provide low-interest loans directly to homeowners for energy improvements and housing code repairs, with support for roof repair/replacement, accessibility improvements and remediation of environmental health hazards among covered projects. Additionally, the Time To Own-Rehabilitation Program will receive \$10 million to support



new homeowners who received support from the Time To Own Program, offering them forgivable loans to help with home repair and improvement costs, and the Homeownership Construction Program will receive \$11.5 million, providing grants of up to \$150,000 per home to help cover construction or rehabilitation costs for up to ten affordable homes.

#### It's not too late to save vital health care support

On Sunday April 6<sup>th</sup>, my editorial was published in <u>The Day</u> (see below) regarding the announced end of the Yale New Haven Health (YNHH) at Home program. This is an important local service helping people in our community and I believe its end would be short-sighted.

#### If it's not broken, don't fix it - By State Sen. Martha Marx

That's time-honored advice that people have followed for decades, but I'm not sure Yale New Haven Health got the memo. Despite having a program in place that supports hundreds of people in our communities, providing great service at a low cost, YNHH leaders have decided not just to "fix" it — they're going to break it.

If you missed the news, in February, YNHH's At Home Southeast, formerly operating as the Visiting Nurse Association of SE Connecticut, announced plans to prematurely discontinue its Nurse Family Partnership contract, funded by the Connecticut Office of Early Childhood, and the Wellness Program, funded in part by surrounding municipalities. Without action, they will close June 30.

This made the news earlier this year, but if you're not familiar, the nationally renowned Nurse Family Partnership sends nurses on home visits to expectant families, providing additional support from birth to three years of age. The Wellness Program sends nurses to the Homeless Hospitality Center, local senior centers and into the homes of homebound residents to provide assessments and care.

The needs of our youngest and most senior residents have changed radically in just the two months since YNHH first made its announcement. In recent weeks, we've seen constant piecemeal cuts of federal programs. A local program giving more than 400 aging seniors rides, food and companionship lost federal funding. The state lost more than a hundred million dollars in public health funds to track diseases and screen newborns for illnesses. Veteran services and Meals on Wheels have already seen impacts as well.

When we're already losing federal support for programs that help people, I would certainly hope YNHH reconsiders this decision.

To put it simply, these programs are not broken and provide strong community benefits. They actually have no cost burdens for YNHH, either. The town of Old Lyme contracts for up to \$70,000 per year to provide wellness care at its senior center and visits to homebound residents. Waterford and other local municipalities have similar programs with YNHH At Home SE to provide care and visits as well.

Yet here we are, two months after the programs' shuttering was first announced. As the termination date of June 30 draws closer, YNHH has refused to reconsider its decision despite feedback regarding the essential supports these programs provide and the hole left once they close.

These programs cost Yale a relative pittance. When they end, we're losing eight health care jobs in our region, but they're not just jobs. They are nurses who have worked for decades to serve and support the health of others. Several of them will retire if they lose their jobs, pulling trained, skilled professionals out of our workforce right when Connecticut faces health care worker shortages. They've been working in local towns, getting to know their patients, making vital connections with those needing a little extra help and who deserve to live with dignity.

These services offer a significant lifeline to people, connecting them with needed medical support and disease management. Without them, our neighbors, friends and family members will struggle. They'll need more frequent medical care, straining our systems and their finances. They'll suffer and experience worse outcomes.

At a time when so much attention is on Elon Musk's "chainsaw" approach to cutting federal systems and workers, slashing first and picking up the pieces later, Yale's decision to end these programs in a similarly thoughtless fashion is just as glaring.

The good news: there's still time for a reversal so vital health care support for young families, unhoused guests at the Homeless Hospitality Center and seniors doesn't vanish for no good reason.

#### April is Sexual Assault Awareness Month

Sexual Assault Awareness Month (SAAM) is a time to stand in solidarity with survivors and advocate for change. Through the power of legislation, we're making progress, closing legal gaps, expanding protections, and ensuring survivors have access to resources and support.

- Employee who are victims of sexual assault can now take leave from work and receive paid benefits during that time.
- Crimes against older adults, including sexual offenses, now receive specialized attention and resources.
- Employees now have 300 days, rather than 180, to file a sexual harassment complaint with the CHRO.
- Police officers now have clear guidelines when handling assault cases.
- A peace officer must be present at the scene of a sexual assault.
- Previous legal gaps have been closed to ensure that non-consensual sexual acts by a spouse are prosecutable.
- At the scene of a sexual assault, law enforcement must share information about victim services.
- Survivors of childhood sexual abuse can now file civil lawsuits against their abusers up until the age of 51.

## Opinion – Salem Proposed Budget for F/Y 2025/2026

#### The Proposed Budget May Not Please Everyone BUT It Is A Reasonable Compromise

The BOF worked hard to pare the originally proposed F/Y 2025/2026 budget with a 6 +% increase over the current budget to a proposed budget with a 3.0% increase. The annual inflation rate for the Northeast region (which includes Connecticut) was 3.4% in March 2025, according to the **Consumer Price Index (CPI)** data released by the **Bureau of Labor Statistics**.

The Salem residents when asked in last Plan of Conservation and Development survey "why they moved to Salem or want to continue to live in Salem"; the top responses were "the rural environment" and "the school district". If the school budget is cut further the proposed program designed to help the students scoring below the standardized test scores improve their performance would be in danger of being cut. The Salem Free Public Library which served in excess of 14,000 patrons over the past year and 1,745 patrons last month alone would likely have to cut programming and/or hours. The Town would likely need to push needed capital funds further into the future for replacement of emergency services vehicles (firetrucks/tankers) that are at the end of their lives resulting in those vehicles costing the Town tens of thousands of dollars more.

The BOF finalized proposed budget for consideration at this year's Annual Town Meeting to be held on May 7<sup>th</sup> (official notification to be issued soon) will likely result in an increase of one mil. I like most Salem taxpayers don't wish to pay any more in taxes than necessary, however, with the cost of most everything going up, it is unreasonable to expect the tax rate to remain flat. The potential cost of cuts in services like the programs at the school, the library and capital funds would be worse for the residents and taxpayers of Salem in the long run. I urge Salem residents to vote YES to send the Budget to Referendum on May 7<sup>th</sup>.

#### Democrat Of The Month - Focus On Gary Closius

Gary is a 51-year resident of CT and a 28-year resident of Salem. He moved to Salem for its excellent school system and rural small-town environment. Gary is the proud parent of two Salem School, and ELHS graduates and currently serves Salem as a Member of the Planning and Zoning Commission Chairman of the Salem Democratic Town Committee as well as an active volunteer for Care and Share of East Lyme and Salem,



President of the Salem Senior Citizens Group, a Lions Club member, and a member of the Friends of the Salem Free Public Library. He founded the Salem Venturing Crew 123 (coed part of Boy Scouts of America) and has been one of the adult advisors (Scout Master) for 18 years. Gary has served Salem's Cub Scout/Boy Scouting community for more than 25 years.

He has received several honors for volunteerism including the J. Michael Leahy Memorial Volunteerism Award for Service to the CT Special Olympics Sailing Regatta, Salem's Unsung Hero Award, Salem Lions Club Humanitarian of the Year for 2023, and the Melvin Jones Award, the highest honor from the Lions International Club Humanitarians for outstanding voluntarism.

He retired from the Millstone Nuclear Power Station after 43 years of service with more than 20 years managing department personnel and a multi-million-dollar budget. Gary's work experience includes more than 20 years' experience of liaising with agencies external to Millstone including the Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) and advising executive and line management on the interpretation of, and compliance with, NRC, and other federal, state, and regional agencies' regulations.







#### **ACCEPTABLE SINGLE STREAM RECYCLABLES:**

- Newspapers, inserts, magazines, brochures, junk mail
- Paper bags, paperboard boxes (cereal, egg cartons)
- Phone books, catalogs, hard and soft cover books
- White or colored paper, envelopes (window OK), school paper
- File folders, shredded paper, multi three-ply paper
- Glass containers
- Tin cans, small metal items
- Aluminum cans, foil, aluminum pots and pans
- Juice and milk cartons
- Plastic milk jugs and plastic soda bottles
- Plastic buckets and crates
- Detergent bottles

#### **CORRUGATED CARDBOARD:**

Clean, corrugated cardboard – basically boxes which have been flattened.

A fee of \$10.00 per item is charged for residential items such as a sofa and stuffed chair and small items will be \$5.00.

#### **SCRAP METAL:**

Metal parts from bicycles, cars, lawnmowers, stripped of all non-metal parts & such metal items as iron rods and pipes, wire coat hangers, screws, nails, etc.

NO: Food cans/containers, paint cans or propane gas containers.

#### **WASTE OIL:**

Petroleum products (such as motor oil) used for lubrication and hydraulic applications in one (1) to five (5) gallon containers.

NO: Gasoline, diesel fuel or cooking oils/fuels.

DO NOT USE CONTAINERS FROM BLEACH OR CHLORINE PRODUCTS.

#### BRUSH (under 3" in diameter):

Free disposal for residents/homeowners/non-commercial vehicles.

\$10.00 per cubic yard for commercial haulers.

NOTE: Compost material (leaves, grass clippings, etc.) are NOT ACCEPTED.

#### **DEMOLITION/CONSTRUCTION MATERIALS:**

See the operator. A fee by volume (minimum of \$5.00) is charged to dispose of used lumber, plywood, doors, door/window frames, etc.

Asphalt shingles/other \$20.00 per cubic yard.

Some items may require showing a building or demolition permit. Permit or Letter of Exemption required from the Building Department.
